



On the Bright Side

OUT OF THE ASHES

Following a devastating fire, Armina Kasprowicz, principal designer at *Armina Interiors* in Rochester Hills, received a call from her clients that their 5,000 square-foot home sustained extensive smoke damage. "After we surveyed the destruction, we determined that this would be the perfect opportunity to overhaul the whole house," Kasprowicz explained. "We could expand areas that weren't working for the clients' lifestyle, as well as put underused exterior spaces to use."


The original interior design included traditional, dark wood beams and an array of antique French pieces the clients purchased during their travels. "I worked with these clients before on another project, so I knew they were looking for more of an open-air, ocean-inspired atmosphere," the designer says. Kasprowicz replaced the wooden door at the entrance of the home and installed windows and a glass door. "The home originally had small windows and the entry wasn't open at all," she says. "I wanted to break down the indoor/outdoor barrier, so I selected a glass front door that reveals a view of the back yard even when you walk up the stairs."

INCANDESCENT KITCHEN

With this open and airy objective in mind, the designer continued to remove barriers including one of the kitchen walls, replacing it with glass doors that access the patio and pool. Additionally, the room is benefitted by three new windows, and there's even a little bench beneath one of them where guests can chat with the cook while preparing a meal. "Because of the damage, we had to rip everything out – nothing is original," the designer explained. "A pan ceiling was added and the window openings were changed." The designer chose porcelain for the floor, island, and backsplash for its ease and luminosity. "We wanted to keep everything neutral and light, and the wood gives the space a little bit of warmth, which I love," Kasprowicz noted.

DINING SEASIDE

Beyond the kitchen, a chic dining room is dressed in aquatic shades and driftwood tones. Kasprowicz seamlessly repeated the kitchen's color palette through wallcoverings that evoke a rolling tide. "We wanted a sophisticated organic feel throughout the home, so we opted for colors outside the expected turquoise spectrum," she explained.

GET-TOGETHER GO-TO

The designer created a new seating area with a comfortable sectional and two sofas for the family and guests to enjoy. The space includes a bespoke cabinet that houses a built-in refrigerator and room for bar accoutrements. "One of the owners is a big sports fan and they both love to entertain as well," Kasprowicz says. "This living room offers additional space for get-togethers or simply gather to watch television."

A tailor-made solution was devised to house the television so that it wasn't simply hanging on the wall. "We had a specific wall area that had limited depth to hang the television, and I didn't want to use a media cabinet because it just wouldn't look right," she says. "The cabinetry becomes the focal area, not the television. And when they aren't watching it, they can even digitally display a piece of art."

SUNNY DELIGHT

The original primary bathroom with its traditional dark wood finishes, two separate vanities, and small shower did not meet the homeowners' lifestyle and needs. In keeping with Kasprowicz's design objectives to keep the interiors modern and fresh, she redesigned the bathroom with bright white tile, maximized natural light, and combined the his and her vanities. "The new bathroom has an airy feel," she says. "By using floating cabinets, light tones, and stone that has a reflective finish with a bit of sparkle, it feels like the space doubled in size."

When it came to the guest suites, the clients requested the designer create spaces to reflect their grown children who come to visit. "This bedroom and bathroom suite is sunny and fun," she enthused. "The pops of yellow against the white is modern and fresh." The bold yellow in the drapery and magnificent shower tile certainly commands attention. She paired the vivid colors with sleek white vanities in the bathroom and porcelain-toned walls. To add warmth to the space, the designer included white oak and rafia finishes. In a nod to the blue hues carried throughout the home, a cobalt mirror in the bedroom complements the finished design.



ELEVATED ENTERTAINMENT

When the renovations began, the designer set her sights on improving the client's pool area. Formerly located at ground level with a jacuzzi awkwardly placed nearby, it didn't welcome much use. Kasprowicz's innovative solution was to raise the pool one story, add an outdoor kitchen, and an open entertainment space. "This is where I started," the designer explained. "During warmer months, the clients enjoy spending time outdoors." The size of the pool area remained the same, but she elevated it to the first floor – creating an infinity pool – and developing a centralized space for recreation and relaxation. The area opens further with the addition of retracting glass walls in the kitchen and living room, fostering a biophilic synergy between the spaces.

When looking back on her design process for the project, the designer takes a relaxed approach. "Cookie cutter perfection shouldn't be the goal when decorating your spaces," she advises. "The house is a product, and the home is a process. You create it with love, care, and personality – you then fill it with memories and experiences." The owners of this revitalized retreat certainly have a sensational backdrop to fulfill such sentiments.

FOREVER HOME | Concetti

This 1950s River House Co-Op located off Jefferson Avenue in Detroit, was ready for some TLC when the current resident purchased it from the heirs of the original owner. "Our client wanted some way to honor the life of the previous owner," Detroit-based *Concetti* Lead Designer Taylor Morgan revealed. "When we learned that her favorite flower was a rhododendron, we combined those hues with the subtle pink tones that pour in through the massive windows every morning as inspiration for the color palette."

With long term plans for the home, the new homeowner had specific requests that required simplicity and authenticity, resulting in lovely Scandinavian-inspired interiors. "The goal was to create a serene sanctuary for our client to age in place," Morgan says. "We kept the original footprint of the existing rooms which included the living room, kitchen, bedroom, office, and bathroom, but we completely gutted everything to create some much-needed updates after 70 years." One feature of this space includes large windows that run the length of the living room and kitchen. "Our client didn't want a computer or a television," the designer explained. "Therefore, all the furniture in every room is positioned so that the gorgeous outdoor view is the main focal point. Whenever there was a wall opposite a window, we'd add a mirror so that the view was reflected to the homeowner from every perspective."

The former kitchen with its basic countertops and appliances was ready for a refresh. Now, this easy living kitchen features natural wood floors, leathered Fantasy Brown granite counter tops, and cabinets draped in a soft moss hue that blends seamlessly with a new dining area. "We extended the footprint of the kitchen all the way to the left of the windows, augmenting storage and giving the feeling of a more open, cohesive space," Morgan says.

The previous bathroom was a mishmash of different eras and eager to move into the current millennium. Due to condominium association constraints, the footprint of the room remained the same, but bears little resemblance to the original. The only item that remained in situ was the tub. "We gutted the entire bathroom replacing the floor tile, wall tile, wallpaper, plumbing fixtures, and lighting fixtures," the designer explained. "This ended up being a huge project because all the walls were poured concrete. So even just updating the fixtures was a big task."

Morgan reduced an extensive area of wallpaper and replaced it with a contemporary songbird pattern called A-Twitter by Schumacher. The chic bathroom floor tile is composed of Georgia pink, or Etowah marble adorned with mosaics between each piece and the pendants have marble sockets tying the elements together. "The overall project took approximately one year from concept to implementation," she says.

DEEP CLEAN | Cynthia Evans Interiors

This kitchen once clad in dark tones, received a metaphorical deep clean after Birmingham-based Principal Designer Cynthia Evans, of Cynthia Evans Interiors finished with it. "The objective for this Birmingham home was to create a larger, brighter kitchen that was more user friendly," the designer says. To open the space, Evans commandeered a larger closet behind the existing range, and relocated a window to create balance over the sink area. To visually increase the height of the room, tile was added over the window and select cabinets were raised to the ceiling. "The client also wanted a separate space for a coffee station as well as seating," Evans says. She accomplished this by creating several designated areas in the kitchen for cooking, food prep, and washing up. "We installed a prep sink inside the island which increased the width of the island as well as allowed for extra versatility," she says. A peninsula located on a neighboring wall rounds out the area, allowing ample seating for this family-friendly kitchen.

"The objective for this area located at the back entry of the home was to create a multipurpose room with lockers, laundry facilities, and storage for cleaning items," Evans says. "We added a stackable washer and dryer and placed them inside custom cabinetry near the entry to allow for a large workspace and storage." The designer also added bespoke lockers with areas above and below to stow shoes, sporting goods, and other family essentials, creating a room that is now organized and functional.

PRETTY IN PINK | Heather Duggan Interiors

Once a dull utilitarian bathroom, this space received a makeover from head-to-toe where the only thing remaining from the original room was the location of the plumbing. "I wanted an unexpected, glamorous powder room," explains Heather Duggan, principal designer from *Heather Duggan Interiors* located in Troy. "I fell in love with this Fabricut wallpaper and knew it was a perfect fit for this space." According to the designer, it's now referred to as the "Pink Barbie Bathroom." "The size of the area stayed the same, but we raised the ceiling and hand-painted it with gold leaf," Duggan noted. After a dramatic makeover, the new bathroom is gilded and feminine.

SNOW WHITE & SECRET CHAMBERS

Schaerer Architextural Interiors

Renovated in 2020, the owner of this Franklin home was looking for a clean slate when they reached out to Schaerer Architextural Interiors to update their classic Tudor-style home built in 1979. "The homeowner was interested in refreshing the color palette, replacing dark reds and bold colors that were popular decades ago," Lona Battishill director of design at the Bloomfield-based firm says. "When we discussed the kitchen design, the client really wanted to incorporate the original slate floor, but in the end, became resigned to the fact that it didn't fit into her overall vision." Ultimately, the slate was replaced by wide-plank oak flooring.

Other big changes included relocating the range and hood and installing a hidden prep kitchen. "The client is an enthusiastic cook and baker and requested extra room for preparation and storage off the main kitchen," Battishill explained. This was achieved by requisitioning a portion of an office abutting a corner of the kitchen. "The new area is a cook's dream which includes a steam oven, refrigeration drawers, ample storage, and a panel-ready hidden coffee station," she elaborated. The final result masterfully incorporates all the client's functional needs and marries these exigencies with impeccable design.

The original bathroom with its small vanities, deck-mounted tub, and awkward fireplace were stylistically past their prime. And unbeknownst to everyone, this space was hiding a secret... "The homeowner asked for an Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant accessible design for this bathroom," Battishill says. "During the renovation, we removed the odd fireplace, only to discover it concealed a vast area behind it." This newfound square footage, along with an adjacent unused powder room and entrance, allowed the designer to create an expansive shower that met the homeowner's needs, complete with a radiant-heat shower bench and marble flooring and walls.

Battishill and her team replaced two small vanities with one larger vanity that had more storage and modern conveniences. "The homeowner was looking for cabinetry and a vanity that resembled furniture," the designer says. "This allowed us the opportunity to install power outlets in the drawers and cabinets; keeping the counter free and clear." The outcome exudes a light and airy atmosphere that will age gracefully.

When the homeowners of this four-level estate decided to repurpose their entire lower level, it was imperative that each of their three sons had a space of his own surrounded by the things they love most. The space — which previously housed a Pilates studio, pool table, and several storage rooms — was not conducive for the busy family's current lifestyle. "The project, which was a collaboration with John DePorre Building, began when everyone was still sheltering in place," explained Martin Bell, Creative Director at *Jane Synnestvedt Interior Design. "The parents were working from home and the boys were schooling remotely as well. The two youngest boys were sharing a room, so the need to create their own separate spaces was at an all-time high."

To further cement the space as a summertime recreational retreat for the boys and their friends, an in-ground pool is located directly outside the kitchenette's walk-out sliding doors. For this reason, durable surfaces were an absolute must. "We opted for anti-microbial porcelain tile and performance fabrics that could stand up to the chlorine and salt from the pool," said Principal Designer Jane Synnestvedt. "The boys also use this space for arts and crafts, so it was important to select materials that can be easily cleaned without damaging the surface."

TO EACH THEIR OWN

"We wanted the bedrooms to be very personal to each of the young men," said Bell. "We had all three complete a questionnaire to determine their favorites colors, interests, and hobbies." The designers used these questionnaires to develop mood boards for each son to visualize their individual personalities. The youngest son is a collector of KAWS figurines and has an extensive sneaker collection. "The KAWS framed puzzles on each side of the bed and the yellow Nike shoes acted as the main inspirational drive for this room," added Bell. He also enjoys constructing Lego models, so several of his completed sets can be seen on display.

All of the boys' bedrooms were fitted with an LED lighting system which can be controlled through an app on their phones. "We sourced the crown molding lighting and illuminated acrylic shelves from a company that specializes in professional stage displays for touring bands," explained Martin. "Not only can the boys alter the color, they can adjust the beat and rythym of the illumination to sync with audio."

The lower level's previous layout had a great deal of idle storage space that was repurposed to create the two older boys' bedrooms. The middle son is an avid fan of the tabletop fantasy role playing game, *Magic: The Gathering*, so the artwork above his bed features dramatic scenes from popular playing cards in the series. He also loves to paint skateboard decks and has even found a lucrative market for this unique expression of art. "One of his custom painted skateboards was actually purchased by recording artist Drake," adds Martin. "He's a remarkably talented young man and I think it is amazing that one of the most notable rappers today has sought after a 14-year old's custom decks!"

"The oldest son is more austere and very reserved," explains Martin. "Many of the furnishings in his room were pre-existing, but we updated the furniture with dark wood finishes and added complementing chrome hardware pulls." Horizontal stripes were also used on the walls and custom cornice board to create the illusion of more space.

"The space is like their own three-bedroom apartment down there," concludes Jane. In addition to their bedrooms, the computer room, lounge area, and kitchenette, the area also has a full bathroom and additional storage that is not pictured. "It truly is a young gamer's paradise!"




