After raising their five children, two Washington DC transplants contemplated their next move. They say the decision came without hesitation; they wanted to move back home to Detroit to be a part of the City's revival. Working with General Contractor Kermit Ball of K Custom LLC and long time realtor, Tim Quinn, it didn't take long before they discovered the former Peerless Weighing Machine factory built in the early 1920s.

Located at the northern end of Detroit, Milwaukee Junction received its nickname based on the converging Milwaukee and Grand Trunk Western rail lines, and was the ancestral home to the city's industrial and transportation industries. Carrying everything from Henry Ford's Model Ts which were manufactured three blocks from the couple's home to furniture and even beer from Milwaukee, it played a major role in establishing this neighborhood.
